












What an evening!! Year 11 ended their exams with a party



Parks House






Whole School Careers Fair

It was UCFB with their undergraduate courses in the football and sports industry that was most popular with students, and so many commented that it was helpful to hear from someone outside school about the opportunities in sport beyond becoming a professional. A large number of students spent a lot of time speaking to Natwest about career opportunities in finance, Resource Productions about creative careers, the Dorchester and Ascot Racecourse about careers in hospitality, Frimley Health about health-care related jobs, and both the Police and the RAF were well-attended. Research Project

This term we had a visit from Marianne Trowbridge who is completing her MSc Psychology at the University of Surrey. A group of Year 8 students took part in her study which aimed to shed light on whether using gestures might help children remember information but also how teachers can use gestures during teaching to support children's learning and transition to this more knowledge-based way of studying. Half of the class tried to learn as much of a monologue as possible just sitting down whereas the other half tried to learn as much of it as possible using the gestures taught by Ms Trowbridge. The students worked really hard and where very respectful. We let you know the results of the study when published later in the year.


