

Work Hard - Be Nice - No Excuses



On Friday 13th July 2018, the Year 8 Transition class visited London with Mr Harvey, Ms Malhotra and Mrs Samad, where they travelled down the River Thames on the Thames Clipper river boat towards Greenwich. The students took in the breath taking views of some of the most famous landmarks in London including the Tower of London and the London Eye.

At North Greenwich, the students boarded the Emirates Air Line cable car, where they crossed the River Thames soaring at 90 metres about the river between Greenwich Peninsula and the Royal Docks. To end the trip, the students visited the historical Cutty Sark - a British clipper ship. Built on the River Clyde in 1869 for the Jock Willis Shipping Line, she was one of the last tea clippers to be built and one of the fastest. The trip was thoroughly enjoyed by all.



Five Year 12 students met with Mr Collins over a lunch break as part of getting to know the views of life as a student in Year 12 at Slough and Eton.

Good conversations were had regarding what it was like to move from Year 11 to Year 12, how it was different from Year 11 and how they would like to be more joined up with Year 13. The students were very positive and spoke about how they receive great support from their teachers, including interventions and study support, and how they feel they are treated as an individual. As one student mentioned, she felt the Year 12 timetable was like 'a prison' at first but it really worked and she took great benefit from it and it enabled her to work more. They enjoy working with the Learner Support Mentors and find them really helpful. *A good lunch was had with very interesting, thoughtful and positive views!*

Season's Restaurant Price List-2018/2019



We have kept our Restaurant prices the same now for over 5 years, however, food costs have risen over that time which we have tried to absorb, but we cannot continue to subsidise the restaurant to the same level and need to increase our prices in line with the costs that we have to pay. Attached is the new pricelist, this will also be present at all serving stations so your children will have access to it.

If your child is eligible for free school meals the allowance has increased to £2.20 to coincide with the new prices. This is will be loaded on to the till system ready for September. An example of a way for the allowance to be used is a £1.50 meal, a 30p Sunpride carton of juice or small water bottle and a 40p dessert. The students can have any items that they want up to that value (£2.20) but any items over this amount will be charged in addition. They will require funds to pay for this!

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



It was a great trip enjoyed by both students and staff and we look forward to running another trip their next year.



YEAR 9 ENTERPRISE DAY—CSI FORENSIC WORKSHOP



Year 9 students learnt about crime scene techniques and forensic science processes. All students were fully engaged in practical, 'hands-on' activities, which included fingerprinting using magnetic powder and black ink, taking footwear castings, in addition to analysing their own hair and fibres. The last part of the session included looking at the collection and preservation of evidence at a crime scenes. In the afternoon, all students donned a white SOCO (Scene of Crime Officer) suit, gloves, mask and overshoes and then they were required to apply their newly acquired skill-set. Studentss investigated the Crime Scenes and report their findings with the help of suspect profiles and Forensic CSI cases full of resources!
